
To access the library databases:

- Check your course syllabus, the library (920.565.1238) or Blackboard for the username and password. In Blackboard, once logged in, the username and password will be on the left hand column under *Library Access*.
- Go to the library web page: Lakeland.edu/library
- Click Databases Find Articles.
- · Click on the database you wish to use.
- Enter the username and password.

Finding Journals/Magazine Articles

Use the library's databases to research your thesis topic in-depth. Find education-related articles in the library databases below.

You can limit your search results to full text articles. Check the *Full Text* limiter box as show below in EBSCOhost:


Lakeland's John Esch library has a number of education theses available for in-house use. Ask a librarian for assistance.

Finding Books

Research for a thesis requires finding a great number of scholarly books. You have a few options:

EBSCO eBook Collection:

This collection includes thousands of education related titles. Go to http://www.lakeland.edu/library; then click on Parabases: Find Articles, then click on eBook Collection.



EasiCat

EasiCat is the catalog for the Eastern Shores Library System, of which Lakeland is a member. Area residents and Lakeland students with a Lakeland library card may use EasiCat.

WorldCat

WorldCat is the world's largest library catalog. If you find an item, you can fill out an interlibrary loan request (see below). Books requested through ILL are available for pick up at the John Esch Library on the Sheboygan campus.

Interlibrary Loan Request

Can't find the book or article you need? Perhaps, you've found a citation or abstract but can't access the full text article. Use the library's interlibrary loan services. Library staff will contact libraries throughout the country to request a copy for you.

To complete a form go to the library homepage: <u>Lakeland.edu/library</u>. Under services, click on *Inter-library loan*. Articles available in the Lakeland Library usually will be sent by the next day. Articles from other libraries vary in delivery time from a couple days to two weeks. Please plan accordingly.

Articles can be delivered via email; books must be picked up and returned at the John Esch Library on the Sheboygan campus. You will be notified of their arrival.

Dissertations Online

These sites have full text copies of dissertations available free of charge. Theses online are often referred to as ETD's or Electronic Dissertations.

PQDT Open

PQDT Open provides the full text of open access dissertations and theses free of charge.


OAIster


